A move to a new neighborhood is happening as we speak for Mark Matheson, who is relocating his Grace-ful Living from North Park to Encinitas, where, settling in across from Home Depot should provide plenty of foot traffic.

Restaurant interiors continue to be the buzz in this town in a flurry of creativity. A morning

tour with the inimitable Diane Powers at her new Casa Sol y Mar in Del Mar Highlands Town Center included a few nostalgic exchanges about the 1950s and '60s design scene here that we remember. At her new restaurant, a veritable parade of pendant Mexican starry lanterns illuminates the main dining room. A fiesta of intense color is everywhere, including in the place settings, and a latia ceiling and images of cactus and agave add more atmosphere. Don't miss a collection of 1940s pottery on display and the serape designs of the upholstery hand woven in contemporary colors.

Up Kensington way, Tracy Borkum has morphed the old Kensington Grill into Fish Public with a totally redone, Nantucket interior of watery new tile; worn and grayed boards that look like survivors of a nor'easter; and breezy blue, green and yellow striped seat cushions.
